Jesus said to his disciples: ³¹ When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. 32All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, 33 and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. ³⁴Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; 35 for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, ³⁶I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." ³⁷Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? 38And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? 39And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?" ⁴⁰And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." 41 Then he will say to those at his left hand, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; ⁴²for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, ⁴³I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." 44Then they also will answer, "Lord, when was it

that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?" ⁴⁵Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me." ⁴⁶And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life.'

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Christ the King

With all the election stuff happening there was an article about the US President's car, 'Described as a rolling fortress, it boasts eight to twelve inch thick armour, has a strengthened base to withstand mines and a petrol tank which cannot explode, along with gun ports, an air filter system and tear-gas cannons. Also on board is an infrared driving system and missile detectors. It can run at 65mph with all its tyres shredded, and there is usually an identical decoy driving in the convoy. Last but not least, the vehicle is stocked with bottles of the president's blood type - and cans of Diet Coke.'

All this kit - so that the leader of the free world can drive safely, sometimes only a few yards, from one engagement to the next.

The little boy in me would love to be the US President's car maker - we used to draw cars like that at school when I was ten, with gadgets, secret compartments and so on. We were way ahead of our time. Imagine the fun these people must have - they're given an unlimited budget and told to make an indestructible car that will cater for every eventuality.

We all fall victim at some point to the amazing advances we have made, Netflix, the iPhone 12, Track and Trace (oh, maybe not that), the wonderful imagination of the entertainers we have today, of the ability we have to protect ourselves from (almost) anything - and we wonder how we could have ever been taken in by the now very ordinary things that so impressed us five or fifty years ago.

Presidents and Prime Ministers might travel around in interesting cars but they cannot immunise themselves from pandemics, the vagaries of the electorate, climate change, or even from the simple need for a drink. Despite their dreaming and their imagination, despite their immense power and wealth, they are still thwarted at so many turns. The last eight or nine months have shown us that all too painfully.

Then there's the regular trickle of press exclusives to show that people we once might have respected actually have feet of clay. The disciples once marvelled at the magnificence of the Temple stones - until Jesus told them that they would soon be knocked down. There is much in the world that impresses, that demands our attention, our obedience, that promises much - and yet, in the end, something else always comes along to show it up as rather ordinary.

So where does your hope lie? If not in other people, then perhaps in your own strength, in your own cunning and brains? In your own wealth and possessions? Can all these things ever be enough?

Or is your hope in the king who, in humility and love, wore a crown of thorns?

If that's how Jesus, our Lord and King, shows his sovereignty then that too should be our example – not seeking to show power in wealth or strength, but in sacrifice. Most of us actually have quite a lot of power (at home, in church, at work, where and what we choose to spend our money on, when we bump into those in real need). Are we strong and forceful with that power or do we find another way? What would it take to bring peace on earth? What does it take to end an argument at home? You can shout louder, builder stronger defences (emotional or physical), you can hope to overwhelm your enemies – but winning like that never brings any real peace.

Could we instead choose to serve the interests of others? Could we choose to lose a few more arguments, knowing that, in the end, God will sort it out?

In all the conflicts Jesus found himself involved in he only really seemed worried about winning one argument, the one between life and death. Jesus, the one who appeared weak and powerless, had and still has, the power to deliver what all other kings and princes, presidents and prime ministers can't even begin to imagine.

All US Presidents want to reduce the risk of an early death by driving around in their rolling fortress - but that very act is a sign of fear and an admission of failure, that they cannot guarantee peace. Jesus came as a weak and helpless child, no armour-plating, and yet he is truly the Prince of Peace.

Jesus can do this because he has a majesty that never fades or dates. When we see him for who he really is we will no longer be quite so preoccupied with the petty things of this earth that cause so much quarrelling - we will all be looking and longing in the same direction at the glory that will be revealed.

Unlike with some dictators who travel in fear and secrecy, there are no decoys, Jesus is unique, he is the one, the true king - and he alone is worthy of our praise, not just until the next election, but for all eternity
